"Herod is going to search for the child to destroy Him." King Herod the Great was a man with a violent temper, ruthlessly putting to death anyone who was a perceived rival to his throne, including members of his own family. When he heard that there was a newborn king in Bethlehem, as told to him by the Three Magi, his violent temper and thirst for power led him to seek to kill Jesus Christ. Therefore, we read in today's Gospel that Joseph, warned in a dream, had to flee to Egypt so that Jesus' life would be spared. But sadly, the other young boys, about the same age of Jesus who lived in Bethlehem, were massacred by King Herod's soldiers. In the person of King Herod, we can see the great harm that results when people's tempers and emotions get the best of them. Well not at the magnitude of King Herod, our anger and desire for power and attention can also inflict great harm upon a marriage and family. On this feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, we need to look inward and ask God to cast aside from our hearts anything that destroys the beauty of love in marriage and family life. Without the foundation of a deep and abiding charity, marriages and families cannot stand.

Difficult Scripture Passages

"Jesus cried out in a loud voice and gave up His spirit. And behold the veil of the sanctuary was torn in two from top to bottom" (Matthew 27: 50-51).

In the Book of Exodus 26:31-36, we are offered a description of the two veils in the Jewish Temple. The outer veil hung before the entrance of the Holy Place and the inner one before the Holy of Holies, where the Ark of the Covenant was reserved. Only the High Priest could enter through the veil of the Holy of Holies and only on the Day of Atonement. On this day, the High Priest applied the sacrificial blood of a lamb to the Ark of the Covenant, seeking God's mercy for the sins of the People of Israel. The veil to the Holy of Holies was torn in two when Jesus died upon the Cross, according to the Gospel accounts of Saint Matthew and Saint Mark. Saint Jerome speaks not of a veil, but of cleavage in the masonry of the Temple porch (due to the Good Friday earthquake), which might have left the Holy of Holies open to view. But, regardless of these two traditions, this passage in Saint Matthew's Gospel seems to indicate a symbolic meaning. The meaning of this passage is that because of the death of Jesus Christ, all people now have access to the presence of God... not just the High Priest. There exists no more veil separating us from the love and mercy of God. Jesus' sacrificial death has torn down all "veils" between God and man, namely the veil of original sin, which had closed the entrance to God's dwelling place, which is Heaven. In the words of the author of the Letter of the Hebrews, "He entered once for all into the sanctuary, not with the blood of goats and bulls, but with His own blood, thus obtaining eternal redemption" (9:12).

At **Saint Ann's**, the Christmas pageant will take place on **Saturday, January 3rd**, after the **6:30 PM Mass** and at **Sacred Heart**, the Christmas pageant will take place on **Sunday, January 4th**, after the **10:30 AM Mass**. Please know that you are welcome to join in the meal that will follow each Christmas pageant. May God bless our young people for this beautiful Christmas tradition of the Christmas pageant, because before our very eyes, the great story of Jesus' holy birth, His Incarnation, is offered to us as the devotional and spiritual exercise. I was asked if I could join in the Christmas pageants, with the role of the donkey in the stable. It must be because of my great love for animals!
