“But as it is, my Kingdom is not here.” When historians study the lives of those who survived the Nazi German concentration camps or the Communist Russian gulags, they concluded that most of the survivors had to choose between saving their soul or their body. Those who chose their soul experienced an infusion of God's grace, peace, and strength. They were not afraid to suffer and even die because they realized that true freedom was waiting for them in the Kingdom to come. Those inmates who had little faith often did not survive the camps and gulags, because they fell into despair and gave up. Without the Spirit of God, their human spirits were broken.

This invites me to recall from today's Gospel that like Jesus, we are waiting for the Kingdom of Heaven, and this puts all of life on earth in perspective. We cannot be weakened or destroyed by the sorrows of earth, because we believe that something greater is unfolding in life. We would gladly give up our body because we know in the depths of our hearts that eternity waits for us in the Kingdom of Heaven.

The ABC's of Our Catholic Faith

The Capital Sins: These sins, distinguished as such by Saint Gregory the Great and Saint John Cassian, are the principal sins which lead to other sins and vices. You might say, they are the “gateway sins.” They are as follows: pride; covetousness; lust; anger; gluttony; envy; and sloth. To overcome them a Christian must have recourse to the help of God's grace and seek to acquire their opposing virtues, the seven Christian virtues. They are as follows: humility; generosity; chastity; gentleness; temperance; fraternal love; and diligence. These sins and their opposing virtues serve as a guide for growth in the Christian life. When

contemplated before Confession, they also serve as a powerful spiritual tool for the examination of one's conscience.

[Rumor has it that the Vatican is considering adding an eighth capital sin: not bringing the priest apple strudel from this fall's apple harvest. Just something to add to your spiritual reflections.]

Catholic: In the literal sense, the word Catholic means universal, from the Greek word *katholikos* (*kata* “concerning,” *holou*, “the whole”). The first time it appears in ecclesiastical writings was in reference to the Christian Church as *Catholic* by Saint Ignatius of Antioch (35 A.D. - 107 A.D.) in his Letters to the Smyrneans (8:2).

In a more specific sense, the term *Catholic* has four meanings. One, a reference to the Catholic Church, as distinct from other Christian denominations that do not recognize papal primacy in teaching and governance. Two, the Catholic Faith, meaning the Deposit of the Faith, which unites Catholics in dogma and doctrine and their correct understanding. Three, the orthodox Catholic faith, meaning that which is distinguished from any type of heresy, schism, or apostasy. Four, the undivided Catholic Church before the Eastern Schism, after which the Eastern Church called itself Orthodox. This term *Catholic* applies to Roman Catholic and the other rites of the Catholic Church, meaning those expressions of the Catholic faith that grew out of a particular time, place, and people. It may be confusing, but for the sake of brevity, all Catholics of the Church are indeed Catholic, but not all Catholics are Roman Catholic. In our parishes, we are all Roman Catholic, but there are other types (rites) of Catholics. They are as follows: Maronite; Albanian;

Bulgarian; Belarussian; Georgian;
Greek; Italo-Albanian; Melkite;
Hungarian; Russian; Ruthenian;
Romanian; Ukrainian; Yugoslav; Slovak;
Coptic; Ethiopian; Chaldean; Syro-
Malabar; Malanakarese; Syrian; and
Armenian.

In addition, there are other rites within the Roman Rite (Roman Catholicism) itself. They include the Ambrosian Rite of Milan Italy; the Mozarabic Rite of Toledo, Spain; and certain religious orders such as the Dominican, Carmelite, Cistercian, and Carthusian Rites. This can all get a bit complicated, but despite all the distinctions and peculiarities, all Catholics have one important aspect in common: they all believe that when Christmas approaches, they must supply their pastor with a plentiful reserve of Christmas cookies. It is so great to be Catholic!
