“At once they left their nets and followed Him.” Sometimes we can become so familiar with the Gospel passage of the call of the apostles that we overlook the radical nature of this call. When Jesus called the brothers Andrew and Peter, along with the brothers James and John, they left everything behind. They abandoned their work; they left their families; and they abandoned their home villages to follow Jesus, an itinerant preacher about whom they knew so little. You must admire the faithfulness of the apostles, who responded immediately when Jesus called. Perhaps the challenge for me is to step out in faith and follow Jesus when He calls upon me to fulfill a need or a ministry in His Church. How do I react to the idea of complete abandonment to His will? We should seek to live by the old spiritual adage: What I am is God's gift to me. What I become is my gift back to God.

Difficult Scripture Passages

“If your hand causes you to sin, cut it off. It is better for you to enter into life maimed than with two hands to go into Gehenna, into the unquenchable fire. And if your foot causes you to sin, cut it off. It is better for you to enter into life crippled than with two feet to be thrown into Gehenna. And if your eye causes you to sin, pluck it out. Better for you to enter into the Kingdom of God with one eye then with two eyes to be thrown into Gehenna, where the worm does not die and the fire is not quenched” (Mark 9:43-48).

The language and imagery of this passage is rather disturbing, because as Christians, we believe that the human body, made in God's image, is sacred. Therefore, the human body should be treated with reverence; bodily integrity and inviolability are to be fostered and respected. Such talk, on the part of Jesus, of “cutting off” and “plucking out” is thus quite unsettling.

To make sense of this passage, we must keep in mind that Jesus is speaking figuratively. The sayings in this passage are concerned with the sacrificial attitudes demanded for entrance into the new life proclaimed by Jesus. What is under discussion is not bodily mutilation, but rather the demand to remove from our lives circumstances, objects, places, and pastimes which can deflect the believer from single minded devotion to God. The term, *occasions of sin*, describe such conditions and has been a long tradition in Catholic moral theology. We are to avoid these occasions of sin because they lead us (tempt us) to commit grave sins which bring with them the threat of eternal punishment. In this passage from Saint Mark's Gospel, Jesus offers two alternatives: enter into life or be thrown into Gehenna (hell). Such a contrast is sufficient to underscore the seriousness regarding these occasions of sin.
